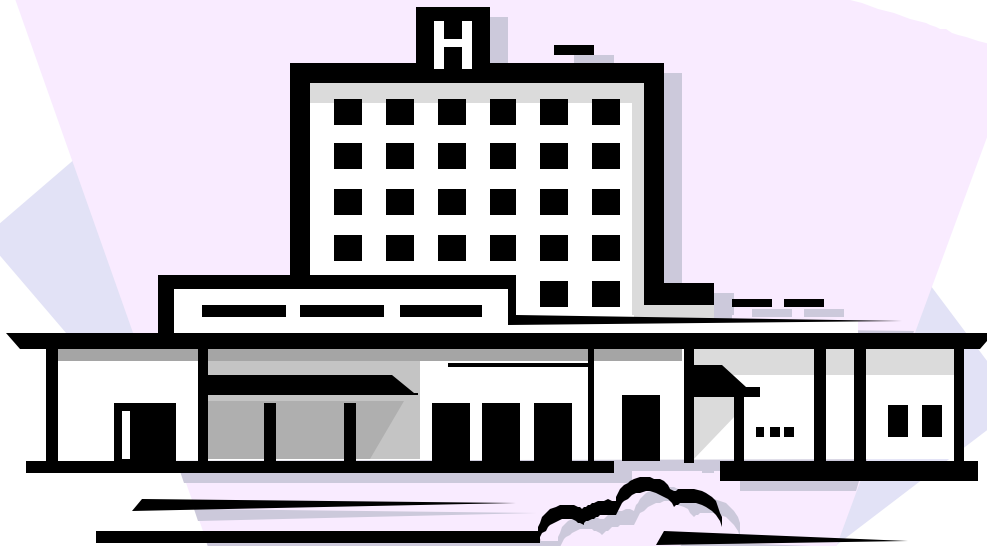

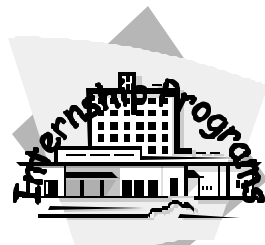
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Family Practice Emphasis

St. Barnabas Hospital

The Family Practice Emphasis Tract Internship consists of thirteen four-week rotations. This allows for twelve rotations and four weeks of vacation. This tract is designed to give you an introduction to what a family practice residency will be like. New York State approves the St. Barnabas Family Practice Emphasis Tract and Residency for the N.Y. S. Loan Forgiveness and Repayment Programs. For details please see the tract director. The rotations are divided as follows:

Family Practice Clinic

Interns spend one half day per week in the Family Practice Clinic developing a panel of continuity patients whom they will continue to care for as they enter the Family Practice Residency. We assign interns a specific clinic session for the year and they are responsible for keeping that session despite other rotation duties unless specifically excused by the tract director.

Internal Medicine: 5 Rotations

On the medicine service the Intern will work side by side with PGY I Internal medicine residents under the supervision of attending internists and senior residents. Time on the service is broken down as follows: Four months on the internal medicine floors, One month in the ICU

General Surgery: 3 Rotations

On the surgical service interns work under the supervision of attending surgeons and surgical residents. We divide the time between inpatient wards, outpatient clinics, ambulatory surgery and the operating room.

Emergency Medicine: 1 Rotation

On the emergency medicine service the intern will work under the supervision of emergency medicine attendings and residents. St. Barnabas and Union Hospital are training sites and provide a large broad based patient population.

Obstetrics and Gynecology: 1.5 Rotations

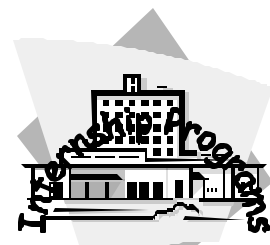
On the Ob/Gyn service interns work under the supervision of attending physicians. We divide time between outpatient clinics, labor and delivery and gyn surgery.

Pediatrics: 1.5 Rotations

On the pediatric service interns work under the supervision of attending pediatricians. We divide time between the outpatient clinics, the inpatient ward and the newborn nursery.

Vacation: 4 Weeks

This will be scheduled through the tract director.



Traditional Rotating

The traditional rotating internship provides experience in the basic fields of medicine as a broad basis for future training. It is comprised of thirteen four-week rotation periods. This allows for twelve rotations and four weeks of vacation. The rotations are divided as follows:

Medicine: 3 Rotations

On the Medicine Service the Intern will work side by side with PGY 1 Internal Medicine Residents under supervision of attending Internists and senior Residents.

Time on the Medicine service is broken down as follows:

- 2 Months of In-Patient Medicine - During these rotations Interns will be assigned one half day per week in the Out-Patient Clinic
- 1 Month of Intensive Care Medicine

Surgery: 3 Rotations

On the Surgical service Interns work under the supervision of Attending Surgeons and Surgical Residents. This is primarily an In-Patient service but time will be assigned in the Out-Patient Surgical Clinic.

Emergency Medicine: 1 Rotation

On the Emergency Medicine Service the Intern will work under the supervision of Emergency Medicine Attendings and Residents. Both St. Barnabas and Union Hospital Emergency Departments are training sites. This provides a large broad based patient population.

Family Practice: 1 Rotation

On the Family Practice Service Interns work under the supervision of Attending Family Practitioners and FP Residents in a predominantly Out-Patient setting. The family practice clinic is located off the hospital campus in a community nearby. This setting provides more of a "private practice" rather than an "Institutional" Atmosphere.

Obstetrics AND Gynecology: 1 Rotation

On the Ob/Gyn Interns work under the supervision of attending physicians. Labor and Delivery, and In-Patient Ob/Gyn services are all provided at the new Ob/Gyn facility at St. Barnabas. Some Outpatient services are also provided at other training sites.

Pediatrics: 1 Rotation

On the Pediatric Service Interns work under the supervision of Attending Physicians. New Born Nursery and In-Patient Pediatrics are all provided at St. Barnabas Hospital Some Out-Patient Pediatric services are provided at other training sites.

In-House Elective: 1 Rotation

Interns may choose a rotation at St. Barnabas Hospital. Approval of the Director of the department in which you want to rotate is required.

Out-Of-House Elective: 1 Rotation

Interns may do one rotation outside the institution. Arrangements are the responsibility of the Intern and require the approval of the Program Director. This month may be done as a second In-House elective at the intern's discretion.

Vacation: 2 Two Week Blocks

To be scheduled through the Program Director.
